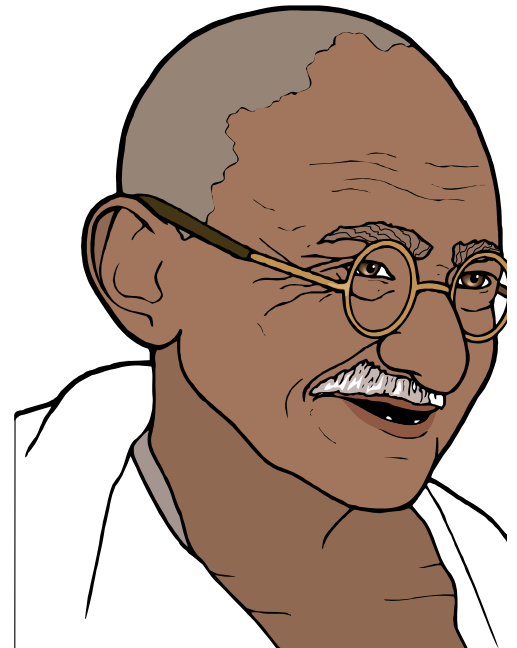


“Everyone’s History” Month

1. Read a short biography of GANDHI. In a couple of paragraphs, explain why he is someone that *everyone* should know about. Include info about what he did that *MADE A DIFFERENCE*. (You are not writing his bio!)
2. Explain in an articulate manner what civil disobedience is, and state your opinion as to whether or not civil disobedience is “a good thing”.
3. Arrange the words that begin with vowels in alphabetical order.
4. Write the word that begins with a consonant blend beside its alphabet code form. A=1, B=2, C=3, D=4, etc.
5. Which words are antonyms for each other?
6. What adjective can be formed from the same base words as each of these?
 *respect * courtesy *courage *obedience
 *injustice?
7. (a) Which words contain two syllables?
 (b) Which words contain three syllables?
8. (a) Choose eight words to use in informative sentences. (You have already used civil disobedience in #2, so leave it out!) Try to begin



- each sentence with a different first word! (b) Write the dictionary meanings for all the words you did not use in part (a).
9. Arrange all the list words in a crossword configuration on graph paper. Make sure every word is connected to another and that none of the connecting places make "non-words". You do not have to write any of the clues.
 10. Use the word justice to write an acrostic. Present your work artistically!
 11. Research an activist of your own culture or racial background. You may choose a modern person, or one from long ago. Learn about what they did to make a difference in the world, and be prepared to present this person to your class. Do not give their whole biography, but be sure you do give the explanation of the cause for which they worked, and the way in which they did this. On the day of your presentation, you will need to be dressed as that person. Draw some pictures to show, (for example, a picture "of you", Princess Diana, standing near the mine field, wearing the protective gear), and have a map so you can point out some of the places important in that person's life. Be sure to give your talk in the first person, as though you really are her/him.
Example: Good morning, my name is Diana Spencer, and I am going to talk to you today about the problem of landmines around the world and what I did to help fix that problem.
